Group Studies—Changes in Policies

In response to student complaints, we have revised our group study policies to make it clear that the rooms are for use by groups, not individuals; that they are for academic use, not social or organizational; and that reservations not claimed within 15 minutes of their initial start are cancelled. The updated policies are posted in the rooms. We urge individuals looking for a quiet place to study to use the reading rooms on the third floor, which have individual carrels and tables. The southside reading room (330 or 300, depending on the sign) is designated a quiet space, and the northside reading room (370) is designated a silent space.
